Wildflower Planting Guide

- Choose a site that is capable of supporting plant life without prohibitive competition from weeds and shade.
- Plant in your area according to climatic conditions. Early fall in temperate zones where seedlings can survive the winter. Spring in colder zones. Late fall after frost for dormant plantings.
- Seed bed preparations means good seed to soil contact. If undesirable perennial vegetation exists kill it with the appropriate herbicide. Dry vegetation can be removed by tillage or scalping. The deeper the disturbance, the more new weed seed you will expose.
- Plant a target number of seeds per square foot. This will vary according to species, seed bed condition, moisture availability, timing of planting, and personal expectations. Plant shallow and roll or rake seeds into contact with soil.
- Moisture is essential for seedling emergence. Frequent light watering is most effective and can be provided by Mother Nature, you or both.

Tip For Success

 Wildflowers are low maintenance, but wildflower establishment is <u>not</u>. They will require the same care and attention as conventional landscaping plant choices. However, once established they can be maintained with a minimum amount of effort and input. Be sure annuals are allowed to produce a mature seed before mowing or residue removal.
